The "right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances" protects two distinct rights: assembly and petition. Assembly is the only right in the First Amendment that requires more than a lone individual for its exercise. In the United States the right to petition is guaranteed by the First Amendment to the United States Constitution, which specifically prohibits Congress from abridging the right of the people to petition the Government for a redress of grievances .
